








Cross country

Last week, we had the opportunity to visit the Smith and Nephew centre in Croxley, one of the UK's top 50 most valuable companies. The highlight of our visit was the Research and Development wing, where we observed the entire process of how equipment is developed, tested, and implemented. It was an interactive experience, allowing us to engage hands-on with the technology. We also met friendly staff members who shared insights about career opportunities in medical engineering. The Geography Department are excited to provide a range of field trip opportunities for our pupils to deepen and develop their geographical knowledge learnt in class.

Our Year 12 Geographers have been working hard this term learning about coastal systems and processes as part of their AS level. At the beginning of November, these pupils will spend three days in Porthcawl in Wales to observe these physical processes and conduct their own coastal fieldwork investigation.

Many of our Year 9 and 10 pupils are looking forward to their trip to Iceland over the Easter break. Pupils will spend three days exploring the country with a national guide to be able to observe geographical phenomena such as glacial landscapes, volcanic craters, geysers and waterfalls.

First Story

This week, students have begun First Story, a 16-week creative writing workshops with our writer-in-Residence: Mr Gee. Mr Gee has been a veteran on the UK's Live poetry scene for over two decades. Perhaps best known as the "Poet Laureate" on Russell Brand's SONY award-winning Radio show, he has delivered two TEDx talks and his work has featured in the Times, The Guardian, and the New Statesman. Students will take part in weekly First Story group workshops where young people can creatively explore identity and experience - supporting participants' social and emotional learning.

Over 16 weeks, structured sessions cover writing in different forms, observing objects, and examining characters, places and social ideas.

Through working with Mr Gee, students will be equipped with the confidence and skills to tell their own stories and publish these in a printed anthology.



Accelerated Reader

Reading is so vital for our students' academic development and their wellbeing. We are a reading school and encourage students to read every day for at least fifteen minutes. In doing so, students will develop the skills necessary to flourish in all their subjects at WHTC.

In order to support our students, we have invested in an exemplary software package that will identify students reading ages and as a result ensure that any students who need further support can be identified. Families of the students who require extra support will be contacted regarding reading interventions and how to support at home. This also gives students access to an online library with more than 25000 titles! We kindly ask parents to continue to promote the value of reading at home.

Sixth Form Update

It has been an excellent start to the Autumn term with over 40 students enrolled as a part of our Early Entry Cohort. These students receive tailored and specific intervention to maximise their chances of success in their applications to the most competitive and prestigious universities and courses in the world. This includes students who will apply to Oxbridge and to read Medicine.

Students have also had a fantastic opportunity to attend a taster day at Cambridge University where they were taken on a guided tour of Jesus College.





As we start the new half term, I would like to remind students and parents of the expectation regarding punctuality. Every student is expected to be on the school site by 8.30am.

The East Lane gate closes at 8.35am each day and if a student arrives after this time then they must go to the Oldborough Road gate.

Uniform

As a school we want every child to take pride in themselves and to wear their uniform with pride, this is an integral part of our home-school agreement. You can find the home-school agreement and further information about uniform expectations in the student planner (Pages 8-15). Some key reminders:

- 1. Students must wear black, formal school shoes. All black trainers are not permitted.
- 2. Students must wear all three WHTC branded items every day; blazer, jumper and bag.
- If wearing a coat/jacket, this should be navy or black.
 Coats/jackets should be formal rather than leisurewear.
 Any item resembling leisurewear will be confiscated.

- 4. If wearing a jacket, hat, scarf or gloves, students must ensure that these are plain navy or black. Branded items with logos are not permitted and will be confiscated.
- 5. All students should have now received a new tie these ties are colour coded by year group and replace the old ties. Old ties which have the school logo on must not be worn. If a student breaks or loses their tie, parents must replace this.
- 6. The Trust will not purchase bags and blazers for students next year. With this in mind, students must take good care of these branded uniform items, if students damage or lose these items then parents are responsible for replacing them.
- 7. The only jewellery allowed is a wristwatch, nose stud and one plain gold or silver stud in each ear. Any other jewellery will be confiscated.

18th November -Assessment Week 2

Our next Assessment Week will take place on the week commencing 18th November. This will be a fantastic opportunity for all pupils to demonstrate what they have learnt so far this term.

Ahead of this, all pupils will be given specific revision resources and homework to revise by their class teacher for each subject.

Pupils also have access to a range of online learning platforms such as Seneca, GCSE Pod, Century, Sparx Maths and Uplearn (KS5) to support their revision.

Teachers will mark your child's assessments and give specific feedback in lessons on how they can improve and progress.

November in London

Natural History Museum

Tate Modern is an art gallery in London, housing the United Kingdom's national collection of international modern and contemporary art.



The British Museum

The British Museum is a public museum dedicated to human history, art and culture located in the Bloomsbury area of London. Its permanent collection of eight million works is the largest in the world. It documents the story of human culture from its beginnings to the present.



Imperial War Museum

Imperial War Museums explores conflict from WW1 to the present day. This includes recreations WW1 trenches, the Blitz and many more.
